A tribute to everyday and family from literary super star Maria Parr

In Oskar and Me we meet older sister Ida and her little brother Oskar. It is Ida who tells the story, but the wild and headstrong Oskar plays the main role in her stories. The book is about longing for a trampoline, about river safaris in the spring sun and missing vampires in the autumn darkness. About cabins that are smaller than one remembers and cupcake kiosks that are nicer than expected, about change and loss. And about pretend play and real play.

Maria Parr has written a fast-paced and warm read-aloud story about growing up and seeing life in a different light than one did before. Oskar and Me is a tribute to everyday life, to sibling relationships and to all the places we are.

The book is beautifully illustrated by Åshild Irgens.

Ivar får ansvar / Ivar steps up Arnfinn Kolerud


A funny and quirky story about landing your first summer job, growing apart and stupid older boys who hit on one's best friend

Ivar is twelve years old and has received a crushing message from his parents: the pocket money is turning around, now Ivar has to pay pocket money to mom and dad. From now on, it's Ivar's turn to contribute. Now Ivar has to get a summer job, but how does one actually do that? His friend Maja has got a real summer job at a café. She serves soup to guests and folds nice napkins. One day, an annoying boy shows up at the café. His name is Mons. But isn't Mons just a silly cat name? And why does Mons walk around carrying a silly paddle?

Kolerud is known for his understated and humorous books for children, teenagers, and adults, and had great success with the children's book *Snillionen | The Million Kroner Kindness Competition* in 2017. The book was one of 12 selected books that were presented at the Berlinale film festival in Berlin in February 2018, as particularly suitable for film adaptation.

Arnfinn Kolerud (b. 1968) made his debut with *Just Don't Let the Snowplow Come* in 1996, and he received the Ministry of Culture's debutant prize for children's and youth literature for this book. Kolerud has been nominated for the Brage Prize and won the Critics' Prize,.

I am V-Vida is a warm and touching novel about finding your own voice, about first love, and about true friendship

Thirteen-year-old Vida stutters, a-a-a lot. And as if that wasn't enough, her best friend has just moved away, and Vida has to start ninth grade without her. Mom, as usual, doesn't understand anything and thinks Vida can easily make new friends. But how is Vida supposed to do that when she can't even say her own name?

One day, Viktor starts in Vida's class. Viktor has cerebral palsy and limps on one foot, but he is included right away. What is it that Viktor does that Vida can't? And is there something she can do to leave behind stuttering, awkward Vida once and for all?

I am V-Vida is a warm and touching novel about finding your own voice, about first love, and about true friendship.

Tone E. Solheim (b. 1989) made her debut with the young adult novel *Svarttrasta syng om natta* in 2021. For this, she received the Nynorsk Children's Literature Prize and was nominated for the Uprisen. The translation rights to the novel has been sold to Denmark. *I am V-Vida* is her second novel. Solheim is from Jølster and lives in Bergen.

A boy's voice breaks the silence. I stop and look around but don't see anyone, just green hedges and empty houses. I close my eyes and try to listen extra hard, but all I can hear is the rustling of the treetops and the rushing from the main road a few streets over. Maybe the voice was just in my head? I open my eyes again, grab the towel I wrapped around my waist, and pull it up to my armpits. I'm about to keep walking when...

"Hello?"

There's that voice again!

I hold my breath and turn all the way around this time, my heart hammering wildly beneath my swimsuit. And this time, I see him. The boy. Sitting on the stairs of the big, yellow house, a skateboard in his lap.

He's wearing a green t-shirt with white writing and camo shorts. His light brown hair reaches almost all the way down to his shoulders.

I just stand there, staring at him, unable to process what's going on. I can't remember the last time someone said hi to me out of the blue. Could he be a mirage from the summer heat? I squint at him and try to blink him away, but the boy just squints back. He smiles at me with his head cocked to one side. It's a real boy for sure. I wonder who he sees when he looks at me? He probably sees a perfectly ordinary girl with brown eyes, dirty freckles, and curly dark hair. Maybe he notices that my skin's a little darker than his and that I've painted my toenails with apricot-colored nail polish. Maybe he sees me exactly as I am.

Steinalderen / The Stone Age Eirin Holberg & Åshild Irgens (ill.)

In this book, you are taken back 10,000 years in time, all the way to the end of the Ice Age when the Stone Age began in Scandinavia. You will hear about stone carver schools, living atop one's own trash, and the time when a monstrous wave devastated the Norwegian coast. The book also provides a recipe for making your own musical instrument from the Stone Age.

The Stone Age is written by archaeologist Eirin Holberg and illustrated by award-winning Åshild Irgens, who, with her warm and humorous style, has recreated an exciting world vastly different from our own. The book is suitable for both reading aloud and for children to read by themselves.

Eirin Holberg (b. 1972) is an archaeologist and author. She has published and contributed to a number of historical works and academic literature for universities and colleges.


Åshild Irgens (b. 1976) has a master's degree from the Oslo National Academy of the Arts and has illustrated numerous children's books for various publishers.



Katteskriket / The Ghostly Cry Guro Auganes og Line Halsnes (ill.)


Eleven-year-old Julie dreads staying over at her grandparents' creepy old house for four days and three nights. She must get used to it before an upcoming overnight school trip.




Ringen / The Ring Martine Grande

Kjell-trilogien / The Bill-trilogy Marianne Gretteberg Engedal

The picture books about Kjell have become a huge success in Norway, and the rights to the first book have been sold to several countries.

Kjell is born into a family of thieves, but Kjell does not like to be a thief. And when the family forces him to steal from his best friend, Sausage-Per, Kjell runs away to the forest. There, he meets a whole bunch of people who do not want to be what they were born to be. *Pølsetjuven* (The Sausage Burglar) is a fun and original story about finding out who you are and daring to stand up for yourself.

Gretteberg Engedal followed up the success with "*Polititjuven*" (The Police Burglar), and here the reader is presented with a real love triangle when the police girl Perit starts in the class, and becomes best friends with Sausage-Per. "Polititjuven" deals with prejudices and true friendship, and poses the big question: is it possible to steal a best friend?

The last book in the trilogy about Kjell is "*Verdas rikaste tjuv*" (The World's Richest Burglar). Kjell's family has finally accepted that Kjell does not want to be a thief, but says he must find something else to do instead. Therefore, Kjell has to join the band. The boring existence in the band changes completely when Recorder-Bob starts, for he is just the coolest boy in the world and he plays the recorder like a god. How will Kjell get his attention? At the same time, Kjell's family comes into a lot of money, they will surely not notice if Kjell takes some money from them to buy gifts for Bob? But what happens? Kjell did not want to be a thief? And can good friends be bought with money?

The books about Kjell are considered modern picture book classics in Norway, and have taken both readers and critics by storm. Marianne Gretteberg Engedal is a popular illustrator under the artist name Skinkeape, but these books are the only ones she writes herself under her own name. She has won a whole range of awards for the books about Kjell.

Marianne Gretteberg Engedal (b.1986) is an illustrator, author, and cook. She illustrates books and for magazines under the artist name Skinkeape.

Yesper and Noper are the best of friends even though they are very different. Yesper says YES to everything, and Noper says NO to everything.

Author and illustrator Kari Stai has captured the hearts of children and critics alike with its delightful tales of an unlikely friendship between two contrasting personalities. The series has garnered critical acclaim, with the first book winning the 2009 Debutant Prize from the Norwegian Ministry of Culture. Stai was also awarded the prestigious Brage Prize for children's literature in 2012 for "Jakob og Neikob. Tjuven slår tilbake."

The books have been translated into several languages, including German, and have found an international audience drawn to their universal themes and endearing characters.

With its imaginative storytelling, relatable characters, and profound insights into friendship and personal growth, the Jakob og Neikob series is a must-read for children and adults alike.

Kari Stai (b. 1974) is an illustrator and author, known foremost for her prize winnning six books about the duo, Yesper and Noper (Jakob og Neikob). The tales of these two have become quintessential, modern classics of children's literature. They have been translated to several languages and adapted to theatre.

Tina is 16 years old and in her last year at secondary school. She has a little sister, Erika, who is not like other little siblings. She can suddenly get stuck and demand a lot of the parents» time and energy. Tina wishes she had a sister who didn't create scenes for the smallest thing. But when someone one day says something bad about Erika, Tina reacts. Because if she doesn't stand up for Erika, who will? In addition, Tina has another problem. While everyone around her starts to fall in love, Tina doesn't feel anything, neither for boys nor girls. When her best friend Anna suddenly falls head over heels in love with a boy, Tina is left completely alone.

Erika first can be read as a follow-up to the critically acclaimed youth book *Seen this?* from 2020. It is a tender, humorous and original story about not quite fitting in, about friendship, about courage and about sibling relationships.

Then Are gets ill. Very ill.


